

# theatre dybbuk WEISSMAN ARTS RESIDENCY

The Jewish Community Foundation Orange County's Weissman Arts Program is excited to recap our latest project: a unique theater and storytelling residency featuring LA-based theatre dybbuk and its founder, Aaron Henne. This residency model, which ran from December through February, focused on programs, workshops, and theatrical experiences throughout Orange County.



This project presented an opportunity to forge new partnerships with UCI New Swan Shakespeare Center. Our programming was collaborative with CSP, the Jewish Federation of Orange County, our JCFOC Life & Legacy Teams, ADL, and TVT. We were thrilled to see several hundred Jewish and non-Jewish residents join us for this powerful and timely series.







In a time when many struggle to find the right words, the power of storytelling to craft new and impactful narratives is more crucial than ever. We extend our gratitude to theatre dybbuk for their compelling performance of "The Merchant of Venice (Annotated), or In Sooth I Know Not Why I Am So Sad" at UCI's Little Theater. Written and directed by Aaron Henne, this provocative theatre production seamlessly blends contemporary and early modern texts and music, intertwining Shakespearean themes with current social discourse to explore prejudice and antisemitism in today's world. Throughout this residency, Aaron Henne and the cast of theatre dybbuk guided us through these challenging times, helping us navigate complextiy and seek community.
